For over 120 years, since its establishment in 1883, the *Darwin R. Barker Library* has been a cornerstone of the *Fredonia* and *Pomfret community*. Our mission is to provide essential resources and opportunities that may not be readily available otherwise. The library boasts an impressive collection, with over 40,000 books, 3,000 DVDs, and a vast digital library of 29,000 eBooks and audiobooks.

But we are more than just a repository of knowledge; we are a vibrant community hub. Our public meeting facilities and internet access make us an inclusive space for all. We host a variety of classes, from art and computer skills to gardening, ensuring there is something for everyone to learn and enjoy.

We are dedicated to promoting local literary talent and fostering a love for reading. Our book talks featuring regional authors and our engaging storytimes for early childhood literacy are just a few examples of our commitment to enriching the community. With this multifaceted approach, the *Darwin R. Barker Library* continues to be a vital resource, bringing people together and empowering them through knowledge and shared experiences.



Museum History



The *Darwin R. Barker Museum* is a treasure trove of Fredonia's history, with a collection that spans the region's earliest human occupation to the present day. Housed in a historic 1821 building, the museum boasts an impressive array of artifacts, including over 2,600 objects, 2,600 photographs, and 1,900 archival items.

Additionally, our museum holds 1,000 books, all carefully maintained by our dedicated curator, archivist, and volunteers.


One of our key priorities is maintaining accurate and up-to-date records of our artifacts. We are proud to report that since 2020, staff and volunteers have cataloged an impressive 5,568 *new* artifacts. This brings our total to over 8,100 artifacts!

We are also committed to fostering the next generation of museum professionals. Our internship program, launched in 2020, has supported the professional development of five interns from *SUNY Fredonia*, with two going on to work at *Chautauqua County museums*. Furthermore, we accept and train volunteers, three of whom have found employment in the educational sector. By providing these opportunities, we play a vital role in helping individuals build their resumes and achieve their career aspirations during transitional life stages.




